During August, we are focusing on our Charity Vision Statement for the preaching schedule. We are in the process of intentionally seeking how to follow the beautiful vision we've been given. We are asking questions like "What does it mean to be a place for healing" where "changed lives are gifted and empowered by the Holy Spirit" and "released to serve in the community for the glory of Christ." These vision statements sound amazing, but what does it look like, and how do we implement this calling on us as a congregation and as individuals?

I have recently assigned my children the task of watering our newly-planted fruit trees and shrubs and asked them to help pull weeds and keep things looking nice at our place. I would love to say that as soon as I asked them, they jumped up in excitement and perfectly watered the trees and pulled the weeds. But they didn't. Sometimes they showed some excitement, but they didn't quite get there as far as doing it right or to my expectation. Instead, through repeated teaching, learning, failure and success, they are in the process of learning how to water the trees and weed the flower beds.

I believe this is the process we are on here at Charity as well. We have been given the vision, and it is beautiful, but we need to continue to pray for God's direction, ask important questions, brainstorm ideas, and then implement solutions. There will be teaching, learning, failure, and success in this process. But forward we will go by the grace of God! And the main reason behind this is because it is imperative. We need to be healed! We need to be gifted and empowered by the Holy Spirit!

We need to be released not only for our sakes but all of those around us!

Another aspect of accomplishing the vision laid out for us is that we can't do this alone. We can only do this together! We need to do this in friendship but even more important as family, as brothers and sisters encouraging and lifting each other up. I have had the amazing opportunity to be part of many different types of small groups such as individual and group Bible studies; a couples life group that has lasted for 16 years with three other couples; fun family groups; and also an accountability group with three other guys that are almost as close to knowing everything about me as my wife does.

Each of these groups has taught me so much, and there have been times that I needed to be lifted up in prayer, encouraged, or held accountable. There have also been times when I have done the same for someone else. We all need that!

ecently, I recalled a time in the early eighties (that's 1980's for you young 'uns out there), when sitting through a monotonous accounting class at Moorhead State, the professor posed a question, "What are the three best things about teaching?" Well, of course, the answer was "June, July and August." It seems that the good professor was also looking forward to the end of the school year and spending the summer at his Minnesota lake cabin. The summer months are pretty valuable to those of us in the northern plains and upper midwest. So while we're busy doing all of the things that summer brings, we also notice these seasonal rhythms in the church, particularly related to service attendance and financial contributions. The writer of Ecclesiastes wrote, "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens." Ecclesiastes 3:1 NIV

As you can see in the accompanying financial chart on this page, our actual giving (revenue) for June was \$79,464, about \$16,000 below our budgeted giving... not unexpected in this summer season. Thankfully, we kept our actual expenses below the revenue, so there was a gain for the month of more than \$4,000. This is good news, and our hope and prayer is that we can continue lowering our yearto-date deficit each month throughout the remainder of the year. Financially or otherwise, we don't always experience the safe consistency of income or relationships or any other aspect

of life that we desire. Still, we can always give thanks to God for his provision. The writer of Hebrews wrote, "Keep your lives free from the love of money and be content with what you have, because God has said, 'Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you." "Hebrews 13:5

the day of Christ" (Philippians 1:9-10) This verse stood out at our Call Committee workshop held on July 19, 2021.


High School (grades 9-12)

Every child deserves a loving family

OMOL Ministry is extremely grateful to be one of the missions that is supported by Charity Lutheran. OMOL was originally founded in 2012, by several Charity families who shared a passion and heart for those seeking adoption, and for children awaiting their forever families.

OMOL Ministry is a non-profit Christian organization that was established to offer prayer support, community connection, financial grants up to \$3,000 for North Dakota families who are going through the adoption process. We believe that every child deserves to grow up with loving, nurturing families and parents capable of providing unconditional love on an ongoing basis.

One of the largest barriers for a family considering adoption is the financial burden. We exist to relieve some of the stress that families go through during

the adoption process. In addition to providing financial grants, OMOL recently started a prayer team. Each couple that applies for a grant is connected with a prayer team member who is available for them throughout their adoption journey. We also connect with with many couples and families through our social media accounts.

OMOL was converted to a 501 C-3 organization and relaunched May 2020, which has helped us make a greater impact by reaching more churches and communities throughout ND. We continue to operate as a fully volunteer organization overseen by a volunteer board of directors.

OMOL has given out over 60 financial grants to qualifying applicants. We are inspired by James 1:27 "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after the orphans



and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world."

The sound of God's voice

ater. Watching the faucet run unattended, draining water into an unplugged sink, I wonder to myself, "Do we realize how fortunate that even in this severest of all droughts (that I can remember) – we can still turn on a tap and there it is clean, clear and cold water."

Not every country is fortunate enough to have running water, fewer bathrooms with showers and such. My friends tease me about my water conservation practices. I recycle my bath water for plants; I turn the water off when I brush

my teeth; I take short showers, and we do not water our lawn.

In this heat, deer come to our irrigation ditch and drink – even in the middle of the day, when deer are not usually active. We stare at each other until one

of us decides it's not safe and bolts. Left standing there to ponder the moment, the first two verses of Psalm 42 come to mind, "As the deer pants for streams of water, so my soul pants for you, O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God."

Water is on the minds of many farmers and ranchers these days. The trickledown effect of the drought has yet to be realized by those not directly affected with crops or livestock in their care.

Not only do we crave water for an unquenchable thirst, but the earth and its inhabitants also do. Toads and snakes move into my garden and follow the drip lines because there is no rain. We pray for rain. Water is fine, but there is nothing like rain to soften the soil and revive a parched lawn.

Water is mentioned in the Bible a total of 722 times, more often than faith, hope, prayer and worship. Water in the Bible represents cleansing and a source of power. Jesus was baptized with water. He turned water into wine. He also said in John 7:38-39, "If anyone thirsts, let him come to Me and drink. He who believes in Me, as the Scripture has said, out of his heart will flow rivers of living water." But this He spoke concerning the Spirit, whom those believing in Him would receive; for the Holy Spirit was

not yet given, because Jesus was not yet glorified.

Imagine that, never being thirsty again? It's a difficult verse to absorb.

In addition to water as power and the Spirit, there are three verses in the Bible, Ezekiel 43:2, Revelation 1:15 and Revelation 19:6, stating the sound of God's voice is that of many waters. Can you imagine? The sound of water is so relaxing. But sometimes, it can be angry and roiling, pushed by the unseen winds.

I took a John Paul Jackson Prophetic Dream class some years ago and the leader told us we cannot hear God with our human ears and therefore we hear the sound of water.

While I do not claim to have heard God speaking directly to me like he did some of our Old Testament favorites like Moses and David, I have listened to his voice in the sound of rushing water.

Are you thirsty this summer? Thirsty for the living God? I have plans to dance in the next rainfall. I know it will eventually rain because I saw the most beautiful rainbow – full from side to side and colorful as ever against the dark sky of the rain clouds. The clouds that on that day passed us by.

SOAR
