Witness to the community

harity Lutheran's Vision Statement states that "Charity is a place for ◆healing where changed lives are gifted and empowered by the Holy Spirit and released to serve in the community for the glory of Christ." Likewise, the preamble to Charity's constitution states that as a congregation, we are called to do eight things (with scripture references), one of which is to "Witness to the community, nation, and world (II Timothy 2:15, Acts 1:18)." You can check out Charity's constitution and preamble through a link on the Vision Council page of the website.

A long-time Charity member, Dr. Marlin Johnson, would sometimes remind the Saturday morning Bible study men that because of the neighborhood in which Charity is placed, it doesn't minister as much to the "down-and-outers," but more to the "up-and-outers." What he meant by that is that even though there may not be as many "under-served" families living close by, there's a spiritual need all around us regardless of income and social status. With the Centennial Elementary School area now having a

large number of subsidized apartments nearby, that isn't the case anymore. So it's exciting to see new outreach programs initiated through our children's and youth ministries in partnership with Centennial School. Please read Maggie Portra's article in this newsletter for more details.

Our Charity family is also a community in and of itself. I encourage you to read Connections Coordinator Nathaniel Oakland's article as well.

His work will intentionally connect folks at Charity through volunteer service teams, new member interest. welcome teams on Sunday mornings and Wednesday evenings, small groups, Bible and book studies. All these things nurture and grow individuals in their faith walk with Jesus. Nathaniel will help bring more focus to "connections" as a ministry and align it with our mission and vision statements.

In reporting on Charity's year-to-date general fund financial status, you'll see on the accompanying chart that Charity had \$16,000 more in contributions in September than expenses. That helped reduce our year-to-date shortfall in revenue over expenses to (\$26,000) through September. That is not a bad place to be with three

months left in the year. While we have been running short in

our budgeted revenues, we've recently realized reduced expenses from unfilled staff positions. While that has helped our financial picture, it's only a temporary benefit, as those positions will be filled in the future. Please continue to give thanks to God for His provision, and please continue to help in any way you can, including volunteering and contributing financially.

Intentional interim pastor will be called

ur past reports on the initial work of the Call Committee have been relatively brief. Now that we have been meeting for a few months, here is a more detailed summary of what we have done.

After the Vision Council established our committee, one of the first meetings was with Rev. Perry Fruhling from the LCMC corporate office in July. He presented a training workshop on LCMC's best practices for calling a pastor. All members of the Call Committee, Doug Leet, Pastor Sam Coleman and Vision Council members John Seedorf and Craig Lohstreter attended.

Rev. Fruhling stressed we should expect that the process will likely take 12 to 18 months and shouldn't be rushed. He reminded us the timing is God's, not ours, and we should take the time necessary to find a senior pastor who is the best fit for our congregation.

He also encouraged the church to consider hiring an intentional interim pastor while we seek to call a new senior pastor, which the Vision Council has voted to do. An intentional interim pastor has special training to help churches work through unresolved issues in preparation for a new pastor and assist with other regular pastoral responsibilities such as preaching.

It's important to note that the intentional interim pastor is a staff position that will serve for a specific time. This person hired by the Vision Council, like other staff, will not be considered for the senior pastor position. And, unlike the senior pastor, this is not a position called by the congregation, which requires a congregational vote.

LCMC recommends churches seeking new pastors should implement its 12-Step Call Process, which we are doing. The Call Committee has completed the Congregational Profile, including church history, financial information, staffing, expectations and more. This profile, along with details about the Bismarck-Mandan community and an updated job description, is included in a packet sent to potential candidates once they are identified.

We have also completed the listing that will be posted on the LCMC website. It is there where LCMC churches across the country seeking pastors post their openings and where the names of pastors who are available for a call, interim appointments, pulpit fill and other roles can be found. That website is http://www.lcmc.net.

Currently, the Call Committee is working with the Vision Council to hire the intentional interim pastor while we continue to work through the 12-Step Call Process for calling a senior pastor.

We have scheduled a joint meeting with the Vision Council on Nov. 1, and are also meeting individually with all Charity staff members.

During our call committee

workshop, we learned that during a pastoral transition, LCMC congregations often seek out interim pastors who can assist them during a time of change. Charity is now in the process of looking for an intentional interim pastor to help ease the pressure of day-to-day operations of our current staff.

An intentional interim pastor has training for interim ministry and is called with a term limit for the purpose of bringing healing and change to a congregation. This is not a replacement or a new senior pastor.

The Vision Council and call committee are meeting to figure out the exact time frames and what voids that person will fill. Pastor Sam and Doug will still be the day-to-day decision-makers with vision council oversight.



Recently I had a briefing on Prosci Change Assessment, and I thought about how that applies to Charity. ADKAR is an acronym for:

- Awareness (of the need to change)
- Desire (to make the change happen)
- Knowledge (about how to change)
- · Ability (to change)

Reinforcement (to maintain change)

The six steps to the change are:

- 1. Briefly describe a change (new pastor coming)
- 2. List the reasons you believe this change is necessary (No Senior pastor) (Awareness step)
- 3. List the factor (Good and bad) that create a desire to change (Desire Step)
- 4. List the skills and knowledge needed for the change, both during and after the transition (Knowledge step)
- 5. Considering the skills and

knowledge from above are, there any barriers inhibiting the church's ability (Ability step)

6. List the reinforcements that will help to retain the change. (Reinforcement Step)

One of the most complex parts of this model is that not everyone goes through the steps in the same order or in the same time frame. We must work through the transition as individuals as well as a congregation. I thought that this picture from the Call Committee workshop brings to light what Charity is going through at this time.

LCMC Suggested 12 steps in the pastor call process

- 1. Develop a communication Plan in conjunction with the church council.
- 2. Develop a congregational profile in conjunction with the church council.
- 3. Identify and articulate expectations of pastoral candidates in conjunction with the church council.
- 4. Actively seek candidates.
- 5. Prepare a packet of information materials for candidates.
- 6. Request documents from candidates seeking and available for a call.
- 7. Develop interview questions, including behavioral-based questions.
- Conduct phone interview or use other online tools, to help narrow the number of candidates to bring in for a face to face interview.
- 9. Arrange and plan for an in person interview.
- Determine and narrow the pool of qualified candidates and check references.
- 11. Select a final candidate and conduct a background check.
- 12. Negotiate total compensation package and present candidate in conjunction with church council.

Once those twelve steps are completed, we will then proceed with a call to a candidate, according to the congregation's bylaws. If the candidate accepts the call, it is common to expect an interval between 30 to 90 days before the candidate begins to work in your congregation.

ARTICLE VI: PASTORAL CALL

The Call Committee will review the pastoral staffing needs of the congregation, identify and interview pastoral candidates and make its recommendation to the Vision Council and to a meeting of the Voters' Assembly as to the issuance of a Letter of Call. The Call Committee's duties will end upon acceptance of the Letter of Call or other determination by the Voters' Assembly.

At a meeting of the Voters' Assembly called for that purpose, a two-thirds vote by a quorum of the voting disciples present and voting is required to approve a Letter of Call to a pastor.

A pastor accepting the congregation's Letter of Call will be loyal and faithful to the Word of God and the congregation's constitution and bylaws. The Vision Council, or its designees, will conduct an annual evaluation of each pastor called to serve the congregation.

want to introduce to you all a new exciting ministry opportunity at Charity Lutheran. Life Groups!

Life Groups are all about getting connected. In a church the size of Charity Lutheran, it can seem impossible to know everyone, but there is

a way for you to get involved and belong. Whether your need to connect is more social, about spiritual growth or about finding a place to serve God, Life Groups are the ideal place for you.

What is a life group? It is where we find, enjoy, and share hope in Jesus together. Groups meet weekly, biweekly, or monthly in homes to engage in genuine and loving community, build our relationship with Jesus, and love our neighbors with the gospel. Life Groups are the heart of Charity Lutheran.

As Life group members "do life together," they should commit acts of service together, whether in church, community or towards each other.

One primary benefit of a life group is the opportunity to deepen our relationship with God and strengthen relationships with other believers. Many believers find themselves too busy to gather with the body as a church or a small group. Why is that? I believe we don't place the priority on those relationships that scripture does. How many of us attend church Sundays and don't connect with anyone from the church throughout the week? Do we remember Sunday's message? Scripture tells us in Hebrews 10:24-25, "And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near."

In the next few weeks, there will be information about life groups on the CharityLutheran.org website. If you feel called to host a life group at your house, please sign up with your information. If you as a family want to join a life group, please look through the list of different life groups and find the one that works for you.

How will this work be getting started? There will be a few groups listed on the website. Groups can meet any day of the week. Some possible groups meeting in homes could be college or 20-somethings, young adults, young marrieds, mixed/all welcome, empty nesters and many more. The host will determine how large their group can be. If you live in a one-bedroom apartment,

it might be hard to have eight couples. Charity's hope is each group has 4-8 couples or 8-16 people. All groups will be listed on the church website, but it will say "closed" if they fill up. If too many groups are filled, we will have to

have more which is a great thing. As a life group host, you will have access to materials for different studies. Some examples are a group of young couples with children who might want to go through a parenting study, while a group of all mixed might wish to study the weekly sermon messages more in-depth. Maybe you all want to read a book together.

What is a 'forever giver'?

hat is a "forever giver?" It's a person or group that gives a gift that keeps on giving year after year with no end in

sight.

Thank you, "forever givers." So far, you have made more than \$22,000 (that's correct, \$22,000) possible with more to come for Charity youth and adult ministries and evangelism.

Who are the "forever givers?" Anyone who has gifted a memorial, honorarium or a donation to the Charity Trust Fund. The Charity Trust Fund is like a fruit tree. After planting with patience and care, it begins producing fruit. Initially, the harvest may be small, but the fruit tree produces more with time and growth. The monies donated to the Trust Fund are invested, and only 90 percent of the earnings can be disbursed. Thus every year, all current and previous donations are maintained, and the harvest comes in more significant and forever.

From the first fruits of \$400 to total disbursements of \$22,000, the "forever givers," according to Crown Financial

Bible study, have followed a successful investment strategy to invest regularly, in other words, be a steady plodder. Proverbs 21:5 reads, "steady plodding brings prosperity; hasty

speculation brings poverty."

If you want to join the action, give a memorial, honorarium or donation in any amount to the Charity Trust Fund. This donation makes you and your family part of something bigger than yourself and provides a legacy that multiplies your gift "forever." 'For Our Neighbors' initiative begins

What is "For Our Neighbors?"

God is very clear about what is most important. Love God and love your neighbor. (Matthew 22: 37-39) Our neighborhood consists of many individuals with various backgrounds, beliefs, and socioeconomic statuses. It is no mistake that God placed Charity in THIS neighborhood with THIS congregation for THIS time in history. We are in a place to bring people around us into relationships with God by following His commandments to love them and share His goodness with them.

We have identified four distinct and strategic ways in which Charity can be for our neighbors:

Community Events

Neighbors get together to play, talk, laugh, and share meals. Yet with busy lives and sometimes limited resources, not everyone has opportunities to have fun together in safe, positive environments. That's why it's important to us to leverage some of our more significant events as opportunities to build relationships with our neighbors. We'll do this by strategically planning and advertising events that welcome the people around us and point back to Jesus. Jingle Jam, Trunk or Treat, Men's Nights, Women's Retreats, and Family Nights are just a few examples of these kinds of events.

Meeting Neighbors' Emotional & Spiritual Needs

Neighbors help one another by doing life together and taking care of each other when situations arise. We can meet, encourage, support, and bring healing to those around us through various ministries already in place. This includes ministries such as Amazing Grays, Stephen Ministry, GriefShare, Bible studies, life groups, and more.

Meeting Neighbors' Physical Needs

We don't tend to think of our neighborhood as being one with significant financial needs. Still, there are currently around 90 students in our neighborhood elementary school alone whose families are living below the poverty level. Most of these students and their families live within walking distance from Charity. How awesome it is that we have the opportunity to be a shelter in Christ that is so easily accessible to these families! We will continue our work to support the physical needs of the families in our community through food drives, school supply donations, etc. See the article on The Helper List to learn more about a new way we can share our blessings and help others around us.

Partnering With A School

THE HELPER LIST



One strategy of the 'For Our Neighbors' initiative is meeting some of the physical needs of our neighbors. Through conversations with congregation members and our partnership with Centennial Elementary School, we occasionally receive requests for specific needs of individuals or families. These requests are often small but significant to the health and well-being of the person in need - think diapers, a pair of shoes, a coat, socks, etc.

We have individuals offer to help meet similar needs, whether groceries, school supplies or clothing. Charity's congregation is always willing to help.

To better organize resources and match requests for assistance, we've created The Helper List. The Helper List is a list of individuals who are saying "yes" to fill a specific need. When a request for help is received, the first person on the list will be contacted and asked to fill that need. If so, great. We'll coordinate the details from there. If a helper cannot meet the need for any reason, we move to the next helper. We will continue through the helper list
