Courageous

"Be strong and very courageous. Be careful to obey all the law my servant Moses gave you; do not turn from it to the right or to the left, that you may be successful wherever you go. Keep this Book of the Law always on your lips; meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do everything written in it. Then you will be prosperous and successful. Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go."

JOSHUA 1:7-9

od spoke these words to Joshua for the people of Israel before they ever stepped foot into the promised land and had just finished wandering the desert for 40 years. The Lord was reiterating his covenant with the people

of Israel that he had made with their forefather Abraham in promising that his descendants would dwell in "The land flowing with milk and honey." This same promise holds true for us. These verses set the theme for our sermon series at Charity this fall and create a foundation for us as a body of believers and individually in a world that often seems crazy and chaotic.

I want to state a couple of observations.

- First God's promises always come true even amid humanity's ability to have free will in either choosing to follow the Lord or follow their own way.
- Second Understanding what God says about life and our daily decisions is extremely important.

Knowing God's law in our hearts, meditating on His Words, and walking in obedience is the way that we can experience success in ways that really matter.

- Third God wants us to experience success. He wants us to not only enter the Promised Land but flourish and thrive even though the Promised Land was filled with battles. But the battles were the place the Lord would ultimately show his amazing miracles, power, provision, and strength.
- Fourth God says over and over again, "Be Strong and Courageous." This phrase is the theme of the entire book of Joshua and God promises that if the people trust him, follow him in obedience, then "The Lord will be with you wherever you go."
- Fifth The people were given the opportunity to trust the Lord and conquer the Promised Land. And they did, and God's promise came true. They conquered, overcame, and came to possess the Promised Land.

Strength and peace amidst our change

ive hundred years before Christ, the Greek philosopher Heraclitus of Ephesus stated, "The only constant in life is change." It seems so true. We know that God's Word is the only constant in life, and it is the final authority in all matters of faith and life. Pastor Sam wraps up the summer sermon series "Charity Faith Journey" in August. He will have covered Charity's mission statement of "being a shelter in Jesus Christ, welcoming all into faith and fellowship, and preparing disciples for meaningful service...through the transforming work of the Holy Spirit." Then concludes by covering four elements of Charity's vision statement, healing, gifted, empowered and released. It is timely that we revisit (and embrace) the inspiration for Charity's call, the prophetic word given to our congregation and Pastor Bob Nordvall through Pastor Fred Thoni in August of 2000. This prophetic word, Oaks of Righteousness, is also shown on this page.

Many times when a change in our circumstances happens, it is uncomfortable and unwelcome. Lord knows, Charity has gone through its share of change. The apostle Paul wrote to the church in Philippi, "...for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want. I can do everything through him who gives me strength." Philippians 4:11-13 And just a few verses before this, Paul shared with them the peace that Christ offers, "Finally brothers, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is admirable - if anything is excellent or praiseworthy - think about such things. Whatever you learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me - put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you." Philippians 4:8-9

During the Sunday sermon on August 15, Pastor Sam shared a quote from Charles Swindoll called "Attitude," which reads in part, "The remarkable thing is we have a choice every day regarding the attitude

we embrace for that day. I am convinced that life is 10 percent what happens to me and 90 percent how I react to it. And so it is with vou... we are in charge of our Attitudes." I believe that the "secret" of being content that Paul spoke

of was the attitude he trained himself to choose each day and his reliance on Christ. We can do that too. And as Chuck pointed out, it IS genuinely remarkable how we have that opportunity every day. I love this theme and know that God is directing us at Charity just as he did the people of Israel so many years ago to trust that his promises are true, know his word and walk in obedience, and experience success in all the right ways. Then to experience his presence wherever we go and accomplish the mission and vision He has set for Charity.

In Joshua's final appeal to the people of Israel to continue following the Lord, he makes this amazing statement in Joshua 24:15. "But as for me and my family, we will serve the LORD."

As we go through this same process in our life as a congregation and in our individual lives, I pray that we would make that same declaration with all our hearts. And may we come to possess the promise the Lord has for us.

The time is ripe for harvest

t's harvest time across the state.
Gardens are abundant with tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers and in a month or so, pumpkins.

Fall is a wonderful time of the year and most welcome after summer's intense heat and smoke. (What did that bring to mind?)

Fall is also the time of year to prepare for winter. That means harvesting, canning and buttoning up the gardens and fields for the first freeze.

God's word contains so much gardening advice. Many analogies and Jesus' parables centered around seeds and growing. I love that. However, I'm still a little bummed about the fig tree (Mark 11:12-25).

Recently a devotion brought to mind the cycle of prosperity and how it mirrors gardening. Think about having one grain of wheat.

It's not enough to grind into flour and make a loaf of bread. But, if you plant that single seed, let go of it, allow it to die and break open in the soil with a bit of rain becomes a fresh new stalk of wheat and that one tiny seed becomes many.

If you continue to do this, before long, you will have a field of wheat. More than enough to provide for you and many others. Eventually, you can share the seeds so others may grow. Matthew 25:14-30 provides a solid example of how we need to use money as a tool and not an object of worship.

Biblical principals also ask that we give our "first fruits" back to God, who makes all things grow. As an avid gardener, I know how valuable those first tomatoes are to my family. The first fruit to ripen is perfect in color and without blemish as the insects or birds have not yet discovered it. We also grow tired of those tomatoes after dealing with the many pounds that follow those first warm, ripe tomatoes.

Oh, it's so difficult to give those first tomatoes away, painful. And, yet, they are not the only ones coming our way. There will be many more. So it is with life.

It's not easy to be generous when planning for uncertain futures, yet it's the one thing that God asks or rather challenges us to do.

The Bible has some 2,000 verses about money, tithing and possessions. That's

twice as many Bible verses about money than faith and prayer combined. Yikes.

It must be pretty important to



pay attention to the subject of prosperity according to God's word. Over the years, I have learned it's not money but the love of money and possessions that can trap us. I have never run out of things I need. I haven't been denied most of my wants and desires either.

I read an old German saying about how God can't fill your hands if you don't open them and let go of what you are holding. A difficult lesson indeed growing up with Depression-era parents.

I'm practicing generosity this year in both thoughts and deeds, keeping in mind this verse from Genesis 8: 22, "As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease."

Isn't that reassuring?

- We have overlooked some of the time-tested ways of helping our students acquire knowledge that sets them up to be life-long learners and critical thinkers.

• We include memory work and daily group recitations that help students retain knowledge and make it permanent. It is a small part of the day but an essential part.

• All of history--the good and the bad—is important. If we avoid studying the past, we risk repeating mistakes in the future.

Classical education engages students in science.
