Revelation: Aha moments that bring change!

can't believe February is already here. I've never been a huge fan of the cold weather, but I have to say that the winter sunsets, the beauty of the snow, and the natural period of rest that goes with this season have really changed my perspective this winter. It's beautiful.

I think that perspective shifts are important moments in our lives, and have heard the term "an aha experience" when something all of a sudden makes sense or someone has a new revelation. It's like something in our minds and hearts shift to a new understanding of what is often an old truth. It usually comes with a change in our priorities, attitudes about certain aspects of life, or what we spend our time doing. I believe that is the goal as we study the Book of Revelation on Sunday mornings at Charity. I think the Lord wants us to have a new understanding, a new revelation of who He is and what He is doing in the world and our lives.

I keep going back to the words of Revelation 1:3 that state, "Blessed is the one who reads aloud the words of this prophecy, and blessed are those who hear it and take to heart what is written in it, because the time is near."

I'm intrigued by this because many of us want to experience the "Blessed Life" described here. Especially if the "Blessed Life" is the happy life or the life filled with abundance and significance. So why would this book that is wholly composed of prophecy have the ability to bless those who read aloud the words of this prophecy, hear it, and take to heart what is written in it? What is it about Revelation that is so powerful?

I think asking these types of questions and coming to the correct answer is

extremely important, and the process we go through to come to the correct answer may sometimes be even more important than the answer itself. When I've read the book of Revelation in the past, I know that there have been descriptions and prophecies that have brought dismay, confusion, and fear, especially about the future. Is that God's goal? I don't think so. And the reason I know this to be true is that I see a different portrayal of Jesus Christ's character and His heart for us. In Revelation 3:20, Jesus says, "Here I am. I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me."

What an amazing invitation. Have you ever noticed that there is something about eating with someone that creates a sense of intimacy or knowing them? That must be why Thanksgiving, Christmas, or even the Superbowl seem

The verses in chapter 13 aren't just for couples getting married; they are for the Charity family too. it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland." Let us all be looking forward, with anticipation, to the plans God has for Charity. Let us do that unified in Christ, in love, with patience, and with hope for that "new thing!"

hat's in a name? I sometimes pause when I hear different church names and wonder about their significance for that parish. My confirmation years began in Maddock, where we attended North Viking Lutheran Church in town. Viking Lutheran Church was located in South Viking Township, a few miles south of town. Apparently, there are a few Norski's in the area.

"Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres." 1 Corinthians 13:4-7

Did you know that Charity means love? When you read 1 Corinthians 13, the "Love Chapter," using the King James Version, in place of love the word charity is used. That has always been significant to me. This chapter describes biblical love, and it's worth taking note of the numerous characteristics of love. Growing up, my mom would remind me that patience is a virtue. I think it went in one ear and right out the other, probably because I didn't know what she was talking about. But that is one of the things love is — it is patient.

to center around "eating" together. It's an opportunity for us to know someone else differently. We interact with them on a different level. And Jesus wants that more intimate interaction with us. But He isn't going to force us. Instead He stands at the door and knocks, and if we are willing to open the door, He will come in and "eat" with us. That speaks to the source of the "blessed life," or a life of significance and purpose. It's in our interaction and communion with Christ.

I highlighted a statement earlier because I believe the practical application of understanding this is so critical. The statement is that "Aha Moments" often come with a change in our priorities, attitudes about certain aspects of life, or what we spend our time doing.

When we consider our priorities, attitudes, or what we spend our time doing, are we living the "blessed life" in that deep intimacy with Jesus? I have to personally confess that I often get busy or distracted and instead spend my time on less important things. And I know

that needs to change. I think many of us would agree that we often fail in this area.

But when we experience that "Aha" realization that ultimately our interaction with Jesus is what is truly important and gives us life, it changes our priorities, attitudes, and what we spend our time doing. Suddenly, we love "eating" with him, spending time together, resting with and in him, talking to him, worshiping him, and fellowshipping with him. It's a change in our perspectives and a shift in our priorities.

My prayer is that each one of us would experience "Aha" moments with Jesus regularly as we continually have interaction and intimacy with him. I pray that we would constantly "Eat" with him and open up the door of every part of our lives to Jesus. And as we trust in him, we would experience the "blessing" promised and an abundance of the joy, peace, love, faithfulness, and goodness that the Lord gives. May you experience "Aha moments" as you open the door and commune with Jesus.

They will be helping the congregation to look at their history – the joys and the challenges that have brought them to this point and time. Every congregation

In the past six months we have completed training on the call process with LCMC, completed the congregation profile, interviewed staff members, completed the call packet, including information about the Bismarck/Mandan area, helped establish a budget and worked with the Vision Council on hiring the intentional interim pastor.

The intentional interim pastor will guide us through changes that will keep our mission intact, help us manage

transitions, identify and help remove obstacles that could keep us from achieving our God-given potential, and prepare us for success with a new pastoral team.

Our meeting this month is scheduled for Feb. 15. We continue to be in prayer as a group and individually as we seek God's direction in this call process.



Dear Friends in Christ, grace and peace.

We hope your 2022 is off to a good start and in sync with God's plan for your lives! We have had a significant change in our own lives, and we want to bring you up to date, with thanksgiving for all the years of support we have cherished from Charity. When big changes come, we need to know we are on the right path and have heard the heart of Jesus. Proverbs 3 brings a strong exhortation for us, especially if we desire to be within His will!

After 15 years with the Spiritual Orphans Network (formerly East European Missions Network) Bob "retired" effective Dec. 31, 2021. On an independent basis, we will be continuing with the Tartu Academy of Theology in Estonia, which Charity has been supporting for a long time. Our friendship with Pastor Siimon Haamer and his father, Pastor Eenok, has been very close and strong. Hopefully, we will once again be able to travel over to Estonia to join in ministry with pastors there if CoVid settles down. Exciting things continue to happen as ministry there expands, even in the pandemic! Especially exciting is the new community Bible School, which is in its 2nd year and open to all wanting to know more about Jesus and the Bible. New people are being welcomed by faith into Christ's Kingdom, and some of those have entered into important theological training for ministries in the Estonian Church. Thanks so much for your continued partnership and support for the Academy!

At the same time, Bob has begun a new partnership in ministry with his long-time friend, Pastor Dale Wolf, at the Lighthouse Church in Fargo (LHC). LHC has a strong ministry in the recovery community, so there are a number of

addiction support groups (AA, NA, SA, AlAnon, RA and Celebrate Recovery) and extensive connections with community services related to medical/prison/halfway houses.

A large staff consists of peer support, care counsellors and servants trained in addiction care.

Once a month Bob will be over there for a long weekend (or most of a week) helping out with some teaching, preaching and pastoral care. He just began a monthly seminar for people wanting to Go Deeper with Christ at Heartview in Bismarck. It was a long, patient and prayerful process over a couple of years, wondering what God may want to do with these remaining years, using the gifts we have to offer. We are excited and thankful for God's grace, inspiration and leading!
