Your donations for mission work in Estonia have had an inestimable impact. Your gifts have been used to train and equip local people who have become key persons in mission work. If someone supports mission work on the international mission field, then, according to my understanding, the most important task is to empower and equip local people.

Home of Hope Christian outreach center which was established at the end of 2019, is a long step forward in

Lord of the Rings (on this page). Gandalf is correct; the "small acts of kindness and love" really make a difference. Those small acts do make a difference. Last month, I was honored to celebrate twelve years of service on Charity's staff. And just like clockwork, I received an encouraging and congratulatory email from the same fellow at Charity, just as he had sent 11 times before.

When asked what Charity Lutheran is, one might respond that it's a fellowship of Christian believers, a faith family. Someone else might say it's that church on north Washington and Aspen. Is it the people? Is it a place? Well, it's both, and I pray that it's a welcoming place where people are kind and tenderhearted towards one another. That being said, we can look to our foundational and governing documents to see what Charity is. The preamble to our constitution states,"In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen. Created in God's image, redeemed by His Son, empowered by His Holy Spirit, the congregation is called to:

- 1. Proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ (Matthew 28:19-20);
- 2. Administer the Sacraments (Mark 14:22-25);
- 3. Study the Scriptures (Ephesians 4:11-16);
- Instruct the youth and provide for their spiritual welfare (Matthew 19:13-14);
- Witness to the community, nation, and world (II Timothy 2:15, Acts 1:18);
- Support one another in prayer (James 5:16);
- 7. Help those in need (I John 3:17);
- 8. And practice responsible stewardship (I Peter 4:10-11)."

Please go check it out. You can read our constitution and bylaws from the "Vision Council" page on the website. And while you're there, go to the "Who We Are" page to see our Mission and Vision statements, our Confession of Faith and Acceptance of Documents, and the Prophetic Word spoken to Charity. It's all there. We need to be receptive to the Holy Spirit's work in our lives and our church body.

When I received my eleventh email (last year) from that diligent, encouraging fellow at Charity, we, as a congregation, embarked on our third senior pastor transition since I started. That averages less than four years between transitions; that's too frequent. In all of its 43 years, Charity has never employed an intentional interim ministry for any pastoral transitions. Nothing is guaranteed, but there seems to be value in using it now. A Charity person gave an airline analogy of constantly "changing pilots in mid-flight; never landing the plane to do the necessary maintenance checks and to recheck the flight plan" (see flight plan above). As a congregation, we fall into several categories this type of ministry can help with:

- we've experienced a recent controversial resignation of a pastor;
- preceded by another controversial resignation of a pastor, resulting in a split;
- a long-term pastorate that needed space between the old and the new;
- staff and multiple ministries in

need of evaluation and strategy for receiving a new pastor; and

• experiencing benign neglect towards our mission, vision and foundational values.

Maybe the term "senior pastor" is a stumbling block for our congregation. Two and one-half years into my employment at Charity, I started hearing that term and the question, "Who should be the senior pastor?" Our focus should always be on the Lord, the only "Good Shepherd," and His plan for that next "pastoral shepherd" most equipped to lead our flock. I know that God has never said we won't have trials and tribulations, but He gives us the power to overcome them, along with hope for the future (Romans 5:3-5). I love that timeless prophetic word "Oaks of Righteousness" spoken to Charity years ago, which reads in part, "I have raised you up from a seed and made you strong in my might and in my power. And it is for this time, and for the days ahead that I have called you to be in this place. For the storms will continue to come, But I am with you; And I am your strength. I am the source of life that runs through you; For you are My oak (terebinth) of righteousness." By the way, the only time I've ever stumbled upon the term "terebinth" in the Bible was this past Saturday, when reading Isaiah 6:13 in our men's Bible study. Good hope-filled stuff.

May the Lord bless you and keep you. May the Lord make his face to shine upon you, and be gracious to you. May the Lord lift up his countenance upon you, and give you peace.

our mission work. This is actually the outcome of your long-time loyalty and trust toward us. In addition to the Tartu Academy study facility, Home of Hope is home to several Christian ministries: Christian radio (broadcast area 1.5-2 million square miles), a Bible school (160 students during two years), a Pastoral care center, Pastoral care 24/7 helpline (1,000 calls per month), Spiritual mentoring center and Youth activities for different age groups (about 70 young people attend). For more information, go to tatest.org.

After World War II, Estonia suffered for 50 years under aggressive Soviet occupation. It probably takes even more time to heal these heavy wounds that still exist deep in the souls of Estonian people. Today, you can see how cruel and evil the polity can be of the country that neighbors us to the east. We have known that for a very long time. We understand what the people of Ukraine are fighting for and try to help them as much as possible. One Ukrainian refugee family is now living at Home of Hope in the guest apartment. In co-operation with local churches, we look for other housing opportunities for refugees.

We are not making short-term plans. Our goal is to proclaim the Word of God in Estonia, claimed to be one of the most secular countries in the world, for generations to come. We need your continuing help in this mission.

I hope to see you all in person at Charity Lutheran Church at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 21. I'll be visiting Bismarck with my assistant Mattias Haamer, and we will share much more about the mission and our current challenges.

I love these beautiful verses because they point us to what a life of faith is all about. It's a race of endurance. "Endurance" is synonymous with persistence, determination, faithfulness, and focus. These terms point us to what faith looks like. We aren't promised a relaxed, comfortable, or an easy life, but we are promised that when we endure and run the race set before us, there is joy, goodness, honor, and relationship with Jesus and our Heavenly Father.

Sometimes, I think we confuse "running the race" with the idea that we have to fix ourselves and get better somehow to then "run the race." But in this passage, the Lord gives us a different perspective. We don't run the race by focusing on ourselves, our triumphs or our failures and faults; instead, we run "by keeping our eyes on Jesus" by focusing on our "Champion." And when Jesus Christ went to the cross on Good Friday. He made the critical statement, "IT IS FINISHED." We run the race through the finished work of Christ on the cross, and it is the Holy Spirit at work within us that is leading us on this race of endurance. It's a race to become more like Christ every day and trust in his work within us more and more. It's a race to align ourselves with who Jesus is and who we are through him. And it's a race to remind ourselves that we are "saints" because of Him.

So how do we live this out? Hebrews12:3 states, "When you find yourselves flagging in your faith, go over that story again, item by item, that long litany of hostility He (Jesus) plowed through. That will shoot adrenaline into your souls." (The Message)

This is the key. Our "endurance" in running the race is linked to reminding ourselves repeatedly of Christ's amazing love for each of us and his perseverance because of the "joy awaiting him." This is why prayer time with the Lord is so critical; why reading His Word is a crucial part of our lives; why fellowship with other believers who encourage our "faith-run" is emphasized repeatedly throughout scripture. Jesus Christ's love and sacrifice inspires us to persevere and remain faithful to what the Lord has called us to.

I think a huge reason spring is so beautiful when it finally arrives is that we have endured the winter with hope and reminders that spring is coming. That same hope of spring in the physical sense is the expectancy we can have as we reflect on Christ's love and sacrifice during this season of Lent, ending with the resurrection of Christ to new life on Easter. spring has come spiritually, and we are reminded of Christ's amazing love, His amazing sacrifice, and His amazing perseverance. And this brings hope. God is so good.


