From the Pastor

There exists a gloomy abstract reality which threatens the functioning of any church: the Church Cancer Triad. This triad is composed of three components which are also intermeshed and strengthen one another. The three components are: arrogance, ignorance, and ingratitude. Each of these characteristics is unbiblical indeed they are the opposites of things that Holy Scripture calls us to: humility, wisdom, and gratitude. Many negative words could be used to describe this wicked trifecta, but "cancer" captures the essence of how insidiously these evils grow and deprive the body of necessary resources.

Arrogance leads one to presume that he or she is better, smarter, more righteous, or anything else "more" than others in the Body of Christ. Arrogance can start from a practical vantage point. We may sincerely have read the most, or experienced the most, or sacrificed the most regarding some church or ministry topic.

The peril awaits in eschewing humility and presuming that our accumulated "points" negate the relevance of others views. Assuredly, someone in Thomas Edison's workshop had the most experience with trimming the wicks of oil lamps – but such knowledge could not outshine the creative open-mindedness of the researchers seeking a filament for incandescent bulbs. It is great to understand "how we have always done it." It is foolish to presume that nobody has valuable insights to offer.

Biblical Stewardship

"Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service, you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already." - C.S. Lewis, Mere Christianity

The psalmist begins the 24th Psalm with. "The earth is the LORD's and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it:"

So the overall idea of biblical stewardship is not merely about our church budget and volunteering for Charity programs, but the main principle is that God owns everything, and we are entrusted as managers (stewards) acting on His behalf. A second principle of stewardship is responsibility. With being entrusted as stewards of God's gifts, we are also responsible for managing things well according to God's desires and purpose. Thirdly, with responsibility comes the principle of accountability. Here, the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30) teaches us for those things that God entrusted to our care, each one of us will be called to give an account for how we have managed what the Master has given us.

And lastly, there is the principle of reward. In Colossians 3:23-24 Paul writes: "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a

reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving." The above principles are adapted from Hugh Whelchel's writings on the principles of stewardship.

A related topic is the concept of tithing. And also the not too distant topic of Luther's doctrine of vocation, and how we serve God when serving our neighbors through our vocations. But those will be topics for future articles.

Ignorance is practically an automatic condition in our modern world. There are too many topics and too much information for any of us to master it all. As made famous by former Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld: there are also unknown unknowns—the ones we don't know we don't know. And if one looks throughout the history of our country and other free countries, it is the latter category that tend to be the difficult ones. Recognizing the limits of our awareness is a wonderful starting point to minimize damage to self and others. Even if we could accumulate all of the available knowledge on a certain topic, it would not guarantee us wisdom. Scripture often mentions wisdom, knowledge, and understanding as desirable and as not exactly the same. Wisdom and understanding about anything is terribly difficult to obtain without testing our perceptions and presumptions with the insights of others

Ingratitude rounds out this heinous trio. Ingratitude invites us to see everything that we have as being something that we have earned or been entitled to receive. In God's vast creation, there are some creatures that are remarkably self-sufficient from the moment that they are hatched. Human beings are far from that mark. How many of us reached our first birthday without help? Even as adults, how many of us raise all of our own food or travel only on paths that we have cleared? We need others and we need God. Perhaps some false faiths can teach people that they are wholly self-sufficient. Christians know that the blood shed by Christ is the only thing that gives us hope of forgiveness and eternal life.

Together, these wicked three influences encourage us to believe that we are better than others, smarter than others, and indebted to no one. These lies are stumbling blocks which prevent the Church from wholly serving Christ, reverently worshipping Christ, and faithfully abiding in His Body.

On behalf of Pastor Siimon Haamer and Tartu Academy of Theology (TAT) in Estonia, greetings in Jesus' name! We all say "Summer is fleeting", and it is apparently true! School is started, vacations are over and the harvest is in full swing! We hope your summer was both restful and fulfilling as you re-enter the traditional adjustments to the 9-month school year and the 3 seasons not as warm.

The Great Commission of Christ knows no seasons, and we are thankful for those who have been able to remember and support the various global mission commitments which Charity has embraced. Some updates from Siimon and TAT are exciting, and we hope you are able to take the time to go online to their website (tatest.org) for the latest in information and ministries. Pastor Siimon will again be visiting in the States for a couple of weeks, arriving Sept 28 in Minneapolis. Along with his nephew, Mattias, and Dr. Ove Sander, they will have opportunities to visit several congregations and many friends around the time of the LCMC National Gathering in Lakeville MN. Bob will be joining with them helping with transportation needs and contacts.

Recently, Siimon made an appeal for some support in the reprinting of his grandfather's book, "We Shall Live in Heaven." Many of you have read Harri Haamer's incredible story of faith through his incarceration in the Russian gulag, the labor camps of Soviet Russia. We are hopeful that a new publisher can be found and funds raised for the printing. Many have asked for copies since we ran out of the books. Please help if you can, through Charity!

TAT continues to take in refugees from the war in Ukraine, as the tensions and battles rage on in the region. Recent building up of Russian military in Belarus indicate that Putin will not be looking for peace, and Belarus will become the new staging area, drawing that country into major conflicts with neighbors. James: 4:1-2 reminds us of the reasons "wars and striving" are always happening, globally and locally! We pray for peace and resolution, even when those things are not sought after by powerful people in the world. The world needs Jesus, and the church of Christ needs hearts being recommitted to Him!

Bob had a very blessed and inspiring experience through the Lighthouse Church in Fargo recently. 




